# **Executive Summary**

The theme for the 2025 Annual Catholic Appeal is **"Advancing Our Mission."** This theme is one of compassion, hope, and love. As disciples we are called to trust in Jesus' mercy, to trust in his patience, to seek refuge always in his love. Jesus invites us to recognize him in the poor, in those who suffer, and those in need. We encounter God's love when we express mercy and compassion, through stewardship, service, and sacrifice.

The Annual Catholic Appeal supports those who attend Catholic schools, formation of new priests and care for our retired priests, evangelization and accompaniment of young adults, and the consoling presence of Christ for those imprisoned.

## Who We Serve

#### **Catholic Schools**

Parish-based and diocesan schools are assisted in their staff development, enrollment initiatives and mission advancement efforts as they strive to provide affordable and accessible education to every child and family who desires it, regardless of background, neighborhood, family income or culture.

#### **Faith Formation**

The Annual Catholic Appeal provides funding for Evangelization and Catechetical Ministries, Youth and Young Adult, Family Life and Spirituality, Liturgy, Life, Peace and Justice Ministries and the Diocesan Institute. These diocesan ministries coordinate training for Directors of Catechetical Ministries, Young Adult, Youth and Prison Ministry Coordinators, catechists and religious education teachers as well as theological formation for adults.

#### **Catholic Charities**

Following the example of Jesus who "came not to be served but to serve", Catholic Charities is supported by the Annual Catholic Appeal in its effort to promote the dignity of the human person and its commitment to the Judeo-Christian vision of justice and charity. The agency assists almost 300,000 people each year through its expansive network of programs and services.

## **Clergy Formation and Support**

The Annual Catholic Appeal also supports Priestly Formation, the pastoral care of active and retired priests and the preparation and ongoing formation of Permanent Deacons.

# **Catholic Education**

"Welcoming." "Amazing." "Successful."

That's how some teachers described how they thought the new school year would go.

Those words could very well describe Catholic schools across San Diego and Imperial counties.

From the moment students arrive on campus, the staff welcomes them like family, and lovingly helps them to reach their highest academic and personal potential in a secure environment.

The schools work closely with parents in the total education of the student. Here's how one parent described the support her daughter received to prepare for the Academic Junior High Decathlon, one of the many enrichment opportunities the schools offer:

"I couldn't have done it alone. I'm just so grateful for it."

It's not just about test results, however, though San Diego Catholic students routinely score above their public and charter school peers. Catholic schools integrate Catholic values — such as compassion, dignity of the human person and justice — into daily instruction, preparing students to make a difference in their community, church and society.

The students are learning and participating in the Church's new, synodal approach to serving the community, in light of the Gospel, that welcomes everyone to work together to achieve the common good.

# Ministry for Clergy Formation and Support

We are blessed with a rich heritage of men who have dedicated their lives to the service of our Church. They are a living example of Jesus Christ in our midst, as teachers, fathers, friends, and brothers, having enriched us with their sacrifice and dedication to Our Lord

The future of our diocese is strengthened by the number of men who answer the call to a priestly vocation and the responsibility, both spiritually and financially, of providing sufficient priests for the diocese belongs to all of us. Thanks to the support of the Annual Catholic Appeal, we are currently supporting 12 seminarians with an average cost of \$45,000 per year.

Our Office for Priestly Formation administers the diocesan program for both pre-seminarian and seminarian candidates, and is located at the St. Francis Center on the University of San Diego campus. As a house of formation, St. Francis Center helps prepare

men in each of the four areas of formation: spiritual, intellectual, community, and apostolic for admission to a seminary school of theology.

Those who are called to priestly service touch all our lives, the lives of our family members, neighbors, friends, and our entire community. Our parishes have benefited from their leadership and guidance. Our communities have been inspired by their presence, demonstrating that living the life of Christ daily is possible.

## **Care of Retired Priests**

When a diocesan priest is ordained, he makes a lifelong commitment to serve the needs of the faithful in our diocese, typically serving 40 to 45 years. In return, the diocese makes a commitment to the priest to provide for his basic well-being during his lifetime, including retirement.

Everyone is aware of the need to appropriately provide for the spiritual, material, and medical needs of their senior years. Priests have the same concerns. They want to have a certain level of confidence that someone will attend to the nurturing of their faith, helping them settle in an appropriate physical environment, and assist them when their bodies or minds decline with the passage of time. We play an important part in adding to their sense of security about their senior years.

The normal retirement age for a priest in our diocese is 75. Retirement costs, including insurance, health-care, prescription drugs, skilled nursing care, and housing and food continue to escalate. At present, one-third of our diocesan priests are retired.

Our retired priests have a profound trust in the Lord and His Holy Mother; and they have a profound trust in the gratitude and generosity of the people





of the diocese. Our 52 retired priests rely on the Lord and us to sustain them in their senior years. As age and physical ability permit, they continue to "Hope in the Lord." They continue to live a life of prayer and sacramental participation. They continue to witness the love of God.

The Annual Catholic Appeal supports care of retired priests so that they can live in dignity, and free of anxiety about their means of support. This includes providing health and auto insurance, nursing care at Nazareth House San Diego if needed, supplementing their pension, and covering expenses for them to attend the annual convocation of priests.

# **Prison Ministry**

Supported by the Annual Catholic Appeal, the diocesan Office for Life, Peace and Justice provides pastoral outreach at local prisons, and engages volunteers and parishes in answering Jesus' call to care through its prison ministry program.

Restorative justice promotes healing through facilitated meetings of victims, offenders, and communities of care. There are many components of restorative justice, including Prison Ministry, Victim/Offender Dialogue, reentry practices, victim support, and support for the families of the incarcerated. These are some of the corporal works of mercy. They are ministries of presence, compassion, hope, and love which flow out of our presence — by just being there for them.

We impact the lives of those imprisoned in 25 prisons, jails, and detention facilities, housing over 24,000 inmates. This includes eight sheriff's jails, five juvenile detention facilities, three state prisons, and four federal detention facilities. Many of these inmates are hungry to deepen their relationship with God. We merely become the conduits or channels of the Holy Spirit.

Our diocese supports more than 20 chaplains to say Mass, administer the sacraments, and visit inmates individually. We provide the assistance to almost 200 Catholic volunteers to conduct scripture, prayer, and discussion services. More than 60% of our volunteers have never volunteered for anything else in the Church.

This ministry of compassion and hope is made possible thanks to the support of the Annual Catholic Appeal. This is our special opportunity to transform lives on a person-to-person level.

# Youth and Young Adult Ministry

The Office for Youth and Young Adult Ministry supports parishes in fostering the spiritual, social and intellectual growth of young people of every culture, empowering them to transform the world as disciples of Jesus Christ.

This is accomplished by providing ongoing formation to parish youth and young adult ministers through in-services, workshops, the certificate in Youth Ministry Program, ministry resources, providing consultation and direction for parishes, and by supporting youth and young adult ministry leadership with spiritual and personal development.

The office sponsors San Diego Youth Day for young people to celebrate their faith, an annual Young Adult Retreat, Curso de Verano (Pastoral Juvenil leadership camp), an annual summer leadership camp for high school-aged youth (Camp Emmaus), a Christmas Gala, among many other activities.

The office staff helps parishes and ministries to engage and serve youth and young adults wherever they are in their life: in school, recently graduated from high school or college, new to the area, single, married, or discerning the religious life. The goal is to help them to discover who they are, who God is, and what His plan is for their life.

# The Case

## **Catholic Charities**

Catholic Charities is our primary diocesan social service agency. Through it, we assist almost 300,000 people each year by providing a network of important programs and services.



# Serving the Most Vulnerable

Catholic Charities meets the emergency needs of the most vulnerable residents, exemplifying the Gospel values of mercy and hospitality, through its services and programs in San Diego and Imperial counties.

The Annual Catholic Appeal supports these efforts, which include offering low-income housing for seniors, and congregate and home-delivered meals, also for seniors; operating shelters for homeless men, women and children; helping to feed hungry

families through its Emergency Food Distribution Network; and providing assistance to immigrants, refugees and those applying for asylum, all legally in the country.

Catholic Charities works tirelessly to develop creative, cost-effective solutions to meet urgent community needs, working in partnership with private and public entities. For instance, the agency partnered with Cathedral Catholic High School to open a food pantry for those facing hunger.

# **Refugee and Immigrant Services**

"This place helps people like me, who have nowhere to go. They offer us a safe place and food. The good people here make us feel human again." That's how one client of Catholic Charities described the help she and her young daughter received at one of its shelters.

Catholic Charities offers services for refugees and their families, legally in the country, to help them to become self-reliant. The agency offers assistance in resettlement, employment, acculturation, case management and health. The clients come from all over the world.

The agency operates respite shelters in San Diego and Imperial counties for immigrants legally in the country who are applying for asylum. Its staff provides them with emergency food and shelter, facilitates a health check and assists them to reach their final destination elsewhere in the country, usually within a day or two of arriving.

# **Senior Residential Services**

Rising rents hit low-income individuals hard, particularly seniors on fixed incomes. Those who are unable to pay are forced to move, some onto the streets.

Catholic Charities assists seniors with housing at four low-income residences: Cathedral Plaza, in downtown San Diego; Guadalupe Plaza, in City Heights; St. John's Plaza in Lemon Grove; and Cerro Pueblo, in the Clairemont area.

The organization provides residential services at two other locations, the Escondido Apartments and at St. James Plaza, in Imperial Beach.

At each site, the agency's service coordinators help residents to fill out paperwork, make doctor appointments, and with other tasks. nate activities to keep residents socially connected, helping seniors to live independently, truly making a difference in their lives.

## **Services for Homeless**

"When we welcome people seeking food and shelter, we see in these men and women the person of Jesus Christ."

That's how Cardinal Robert W. McElroy began his blessing of a day center for homeless men and women Catholic Charities formally opened in May of 2023 in El Centro. The center is a one-of-its-kind facility in Imperial County that provides "wraparound" services seven days a week, 365 days a year. Homeless individuals can eat there, do laundry, take a shower, or take a respite from extreme temperatures. They can also get referrals to deal with mental health issues, substance-abuse problems, find a job, or to obtain disability benefits.

The center is just one of the ways the organization assists the most vulnerable in our region, be they low-income seniors, hungry families, documented immigrants and homeless individuals.

The agency offers emergency and temporary housing for individuals in precarious housing situations. This includes La Posada de Guadalupe, which provides short- and long-term housing for homeless men and farmworkers; Rachel's Women Center, a drop-in center for unhoused women; Rachel's Night Shelter, which offers emergency



overnight housing for women; Rachel's Promise, a shelter that offers services to help women begin their journey to self-sufficiency; Rachel's Apartments, affordable studio apartments for women in recovery; and House of Rachel/Casa María, which offers an independent living opportunity for unhoused women.

A contribution to the Annual Catholic Appeal helps to sustain all of these efforts. As the homeless population grows, this assistance is needed now more than ever.

# **Appeal Pledge Response**

# Once the homily is over please conduct the "Advancing Our Mission" pleage response:

- · Briefly discuss the Annual Catholic Appeal and its benefits to both personal stewardship and the communities in which your parishioners live.
- · Ask parishioners to ready their pledge response cards they brought from home (from the letter they received in the mail) (see page 19).
- · If they did not bring any from home, please ask them to grab one from the pew.
- · Ask parishioners to take a moment to fill it out.
- Fill out your card at the same time make it very clear that you are making a pledge.
- If parishioners have already given their pledge, or contributed online, ask them to check "online" box or write pledge amount.
- · Some parishioners are not able to participate financially; ask that they respond with their prayers indicated on the pledge response card.
- Tell the parishioners that you want 100% participation as a demonstration of the parish's commitment to stewardship.
- · Have ushers pick up the pledge response cards and envelopes and bring them to the altar.
- Bless the pledge response cards, the parishioners who gave them, and the people who will benefit from their stewardship.

# Advancing Our Mission and the Parish Lay Committee

### **Summary**

Over the years, some parishes have created a committee to conduct the activities related to the Annual Catholic Appeal. Consisting of 3-5 members, these committees are often able to achieve great success while assuming some of the Appeal tasks from the Pastor and parish staff. Ideally, these committees are led by a "champion," someone who is passionate about the causes supported by the Appeal. The Office of Stewardship recommends formation of a lay committee to assist the pastor with Appeal activities.

#### Recruitment

Recruiting the committee can be done in a weekend:

- · Announcement at Mass
- · Bulletin Announcement
- · Personal Appointment by the Pastor

#### **Coordination of Activities**

The Office for Stewardship has produced this parish leadership guide and will email it to every pastor and key members of his parish staff upon request. We can also email the parish leadership guide directly to Appeal Committee members upon request. Please contact Manny Aguilar at maguilar@sdcatholic.org for details.

The parish leadership guide describes how to conduct the appeal in the parish. It includes activities such as displaying posters and Lay Witness talks. We recommended that the pastor review the guide and determine which tasks he can delegate to his staff and to the lay committee.

#### **Activities**

Specifically, the activities that can be conducted by the lay committee include:

- · Displaying the posters in high traffic areas of the church
- · Coordinating the distribution of in-pew intention forms, brochures and pencils
- · Collecting intention envelopes and preparing them to be sent to the Pastoral Center
- · Setting up a table/information center about the Appeal
- · Preparing for Lay Witness talks

The Lay Witness talk is critical to the success of reaching goal within the parish. Every parish has generous contributors to the Appeal. (The Office for Stewardship can help identify these individuals.) Committee members or prior givers to the Appeal are great candidates for the Lay Witness talk. Once the Lay Witness is identified and accepts the invitation, the committee can train him/her for the talk using the Lay Witness guide on page 18 of the guide.

The table/information center is a concept that has been used to great success at parishes. It is simply a place where parishioners can get brochures and more information about the Appeal.

Some parishes have a visual reminder, like a thermometer, that reports on the progress toward the parish goal. Some parishes also put together other visuals such as pictures and the poster to help draw parishioners to the table. The table should be attended by at least one committee member during the Announcement Weekend and Appeal Weekend.

# Lay Witness Guide

The lay witness is important to successful communication of the Appeal. Awareness of the diocese among parishioners may be low. Lay witnesses can increase that awareness by speak-

ing about why they are contributing to the appeal and why it is important to Stewardship and their walk with Christ.

## Sample Lay Witness Talk:

- · If nervous, share a bit about yourself "I am Jane and I've been a parishioner of St. Francis for 10 years. The thing I love about this parish is that it is so hospitable."

## **Processing Parishioner Pledge Cards**

- 1. Open response envelopes, and find corresponding bar code label.
- 2. Affix bar code label (if found) onto pledge card in the area marked "For Parish Use Only (Place ACA Donor Label Here)"
- 3. If no bar code label is found, please leave area blank.
- 4. Remove ANY CASH from envelopes. Issue a Parish Check for total cash donations.
- 5. Batch Pledge Cards by payment type:
  - a. PNP Pledge No Payment
  - b. PWC Pledge w/Check (or Money Order)
  - c. PPC Pledge w/Parish Check
  - d. PCC Credit Card
- 6. For your own records, parishes may wish to record parishioner pledges.

#### Batching Pledge Cards According to Payment Type
